- Full Name
- Email Address (a professional one)
- Phone Number

2 Introduction to you

- Big achievements
- ▶ What you are like as a person and how this translates professionally
- Include some key strengths, particularly any that the role requires
- Keep this section brief

Work experience

Start with your most recent or current position and work backwards, list your other previous jobs. You should include:

- Dates of employment
- Company name
- Job title
- Your main responsibilities and if possible, a quantitative example of a successful demonstration of your responsibilities and skill set
- Brokers will look for experiences that align with great customer service, negotiation, communication, professionalism and teamwork (to name a few)

Education

Start with your most recent or current education and list out your history going back to high school. You should include:

- Name of where you studied
- Dates of study
- The qualification/grade you achieved

Other achievements, qualifications and skills

- ▶ Highlight interests and skills that can transfer into a professional setting
- Include any specialist or informal training you've completed. This might be from school, TAFE, online courses or workshops
- Showcase your computer and digital skills, especially being a quick learner of different systems, proficiency in excel, powerpoint and word
- Any academic awards that demonstrate commitment and any further key skills
- If you have room in your CV, perhaps include some hobbies or interests

What makes a CV stand out to a broker firm? ▶▶▶

If you're a graduate or looking to move into the insurance broking industry, here are some key things employers look for when reviewing applications.

Tailor Your Application

- Always customise your CV and cover letter for each firm.
- Highlight the skills and experiences that match what the company is advertising for.
- If you're new to the industry, focus on transferable skills and show genuine interest in insurance in your cover letter or opening paragraph.

Showcase Relevant Experience

You don't need prior experience in insurance to get started. Many brokers value backgrounds in:

- Customer service
- Sales or retail
- Office administration
- Hospitality or other client-facing roles

These experiences demonstrate your ability to communicate, solve problems, and work well with people - all essential traits for a broker.

Highlight Your Skills

Insurance broking requires a mix of interpersonal and technical skills. Employers look for evidence of:

Soft Skills

- Strong communication (written, verbal and phone)
- Listening and empathy for client needs
- Problem-solving and negotiation skills
- Teamwork and collaboration
- Initiative, curiosity, and a willingness to learn

Technical & Professional Skills

- Attention to detail and accuracy
- Organisation and multitasking
- ► IT and digital literacy (especially using CRM systems, Microsoft Office, etc.)
- Ability to manage time and priorities effectively





Present Your CV Professionally

- Keep it clear, well-organised, and easy to read
- Use a simple font and layout
- Keep it to no more than 2 pages
- Check carefully for spelling or grammar errors

Education & Qualifications

While specific qualifications aren't required to begin a career in insurance broking, demonstrating how your education and existing skills translate to a professional broking environment can be highly beneficial.

While not essential, completing a **Tier 1 in Insurance Broking qualification** can be an advantage for entry-level applicants.

Include any other relevant qualifications or courses, including anything professional or technical skill based.

Stand Out

Employers value applicants who can demonstrate:

- Achievements or examples of initiative
- ► Times you've **improved a process** or come up with a **new idea**
- A willingness to take feedback and grow
